Editors and Contributors

Bartłomiej Błesznowski is a historian of ideas and sociologist of knowledge, and a researcher in the Institute of Applied Social Sciences at the University of Warsaw. In his work, he deals with issues of power and politics in contemporary society, combining social science with philosophy. He is the author of a monograph on Michel Foucault (*Batalia o człowieka*. *Genealogia władzy Michela Foucaulta jako próba wyzwolenia podmiotu*, 2009) and is editor of the Polish edition of his late writings (Michel Foucault, *Kim Pan jest, Profesorze Foucault? Debaty, rozmowy, polemiki*, 2013). He has edited a volume on Polish cooperative traditions (*Kooperatyzm, spółdzielczność, demokracja*, 2014) and coedited, with Marcin Król, a series of books on the history of Polish ideas (*Genealogia współczesności. Historia idei w Polsce 1815–1939*, 2013–2015).

Elżbieta Ciżewska-Martyńska is a historian of ideas and sociologist, and Assistant Professor in the Institute of Applied Social Sciences at the University of Warsaw. Her interests are in Polish and Euro-Atlantic political ideas of the 19th and 20th centuries, the democratic opposition in Poland after the Second World War, the Solidarity movement and the sociology of social movements. Her most recent book, *Filozofia publiczna Solidarności: Solidarność 1980–1981 z perspektywy republikańskiej tradycji politycznej* (2010), received the Polish Prime Minister Prize for Best PhD Dissertation.

Marek Cichocki is visiting Professor in the College of Europe (Natolin) and Professor of Sociology at Collegium Civitas in Warsaw. In 1996–2015 he taught Political Philosophy and History of Ideas in the Institute of Applied Social Studies at the University of Warsaw. Cichocki holds the position of research director in Natolin European Centre. He is a Member of the Advisory Board of European Solidarity Center in Gdańsk and of the Institute of Western Studies in Poznań. In 2007–2010 he was the Advisor for European Affairs to the President of Poland. In 2007 he was a co-negotiator of the Lisbon Treaty on behalf of the President of Poland.

Grzegorz Krzywiec is Assistant Professor in the Institute of History at the Polish Academy of Sciences. He writes extensively on Polish anti-Semitism, Polish-Jewish relations and right-wing politics in Poland and Central and East Europe. His most recent book is *Chauvinism, Polish style. The Case of Roman Dmowski. Beginnings* (1886–1905) (2015). Krzywiec is completing a book on modern Polish anti-Semitism in Central and East European contexts (1880–1914).

Maciej Janowski is Associate Professor in the Institute of History at the Polish Academy of Sciences and Recurrent Visiting Associate Professor at the Central European University in Budapest. His research is centered on the history of Poland and Central Europe in the 19th century. His recent books are *Polish Liberal Thought before 1918* (2004) and *Birth of the Intelligentsia*, 1750–1831 (2014; first volume of *A History of the Polish Intelligentsia*, edited by Jerzy Jedlicki).

Marcin Król is Professor of History of Ideas at the University of Warsaw and a former dean of the Department of Applied Social Sciences at the same university. He is the author of more than 20 books on Polish intellectual history and political theory. His most recent publications include Europa w obliczu końca (2012), Klęska rozumu (2013), Wielcy władcy (2014) and Byliśmy głupi (2015). He is also coeditor, with Bartłomiej Błesznowski, of a series of books on the history of Polish ideas (Genealogia współczesności. Historia idei w Polsce 1815–1939, 2013–2015). Król is a regular contributor to major Polish media outlets.

Piotr Laskowski is Assistant Professor in the Institute of Applied Social Sciences at the University of Warsaw. His research focuses on the history of ideas, political philosophy of the 19th and 20th centuries, and libertarian pedagogy. He is author of *Szkice z dziejow anarchizmu* (2006, 2007) and *Maszyny wojenne*. *Georges Sorel i strategie radykalnej filozofii politycznej* (2011, abridged version in French in *Mil neuf cent* 32, 2014). He was also a cofounder of the "free school" Jacek Kuroń High School in Warsaw, and its first head teacher (2006–2010).

Andrzej Mencwel is a critic, essayist, Professor of History and Cultural Anthropology, and a former head of the Institute of Polish Culture at the University of Warsaw. He published several books on Polish intellectual history, among them *Stanisław Brzozowski*. *Kształtowanie myśli krytycznej* (1976), *Etos lewicy* (1990) and *Przedwiośnie czy potop* (1997), each of which was awarded by the Polish Ministry of Education. His most recent book, *Stanisław Brzozowski*. *Postawa krytyczna*. *Wiek XX* (2014), was awarded the Book of Year 2014 mention sponsored by the magazine *Nowe Książki*.

Łukasz Mikołajewski is an intellectual historian and a sociologist, Assistant Professor in the Institute of Applied Social Sciences at the University of Warsaw

and lecturer in the Artes Liberales Department and Postgraduate School of Museum Studies in the Institute of History of Art. Most recently he was awarded the Remarque Visiting Fellowship at New York University to prepare a book edition of his PhD dissertation on the Polish émigré journal *Kultura* and its milieu and the postwar reformulations of the west. Mikołajewski is also at work on a book on the anthropology of 20th-century political murders and court cases that followed them.

Adam Puchejda is a historian of ideas and political theorist, and a researcher at the University of Warsaw. His interests range from history and sociology of intellectuals to media studies and political theory. Most recently, he edited and wrote an introduction to Mieczysław Szerer's Śmiertelni bogowie. Rzecz o demokracji i dyktaturze (2014 [1939]). Moreover, he is an editor of a volume of correspondence of Czesław Miłosz and Jan Błoński, and is preparing a book of interviews with Ludwik Flaszen. Puchejda is also an op-ed commentator and writes for major Polish media outlets.

Jan Skoczyński is Professor of History of Philosophy at the Jagiellonian University. He specializes in Polish philosophical and social thought of the turn of 19th and 20th centuries, philosophy of history and Polish philosophical historiography. His research is focused on ideas of messianism, pessimism, totalism, culture, civilization and contemporary neo-Paganism. Skoczyński is an author of among others: Wartość pesymizmu. Studia i szkice o Marianie Zdziechowskim (1994), Idee historiozoficzne Feliksa Konecznego (1991), Koneczny. Teoria cywilizacji (2003), Neognoza polska (2004), and Historia filozofii polskiej (with Jan Woleński, 2010).

Timothy Snyder is Housum Professor of History at Yale University. He is the author of *Bloodlands: Europe Between Hitler and Stalin* (2010), which received the literature award of the American Academy of Arts and Letters, the Hannah Arendt Prize and the Leipzig Book Prize for European Understanding. His most recent book is *Black Earth: The Holocaust as History and Warning* (2015). Snyder is a frequent contributor to *The New York Review of Books* and the *Times Literary Supplement*. He is a permanent fellow of the Institute for Human Sciences in Vienna.
